During the day the Jamie the biologist visited some of the more popular beats to catch up with some of the anglers. It became apparent that there were plenty of kelts in the system a good sign of healthy spawning last autumn. Jamie took this opportunity to pass on some scale packets to anglers to enable them to collect scales from their catches over the season.

Word soon spread that spring fish were caught on some of the lower beats with the ADAA, Grandhome and Stoneywood waters bearing a total of 10 spring fish.

The opening ceremony was held on the 12th of Feb at Inverurie hosted by the Inverurie Angling Association once again. The event was well attended and thanks must go to the minister for his blessing of the river and to the hosts for their welcome and the of course the dram.

Planting out Broodstock

The Trust has been in the process of assisting the Don District Salmon Fishery Board (DDSFB) with their broodstock programme for 2010/11. One of the initiatives that the Trust has assisted with is the identification of appropriate broodstock progeny planting locations, densities and methods. The biologist Jamie prepared a document outlining these suggestions using guidance from Marine Scotland.

Following discussions with the DDSFB the programme of planting out started in early Feb.

Bio-Security Plan

The River Don Trust Bio Security Plan has been completed and a copy will be available on the website for all to download shortly. The Trust would like to thank all of those who have provided comments and been involved in the consultation process. Some of the initiatives are already underway and we have also made a bid for an invasive plant control programme for the upper Don, which if successful will start this year, keep an eye on the website for regular updates. You may already have seen some of our leaflets and posters across the catchment. We have produced a document identifying locations for the provision of disinfecting services for *Gyrodactylus salaris* as indicated in the last newsletter. The Trust office is also
